LENTEN STUDY - **Revolutionizing Christian Stewardship For the 21<sup>st</sup> Century** By D .R Dick



CHAPTER 3 - *The earth at the center: The danger of displacing the Christ*  
- summarized by Mary Anna Gray

In this chapter the author states, "We call for a radical reorientation in our understanding of Christian stewardship. Such a reorientation must begin with the question of what it means to **be** the church. Stewardship is not a program of the church, but a way of understanding the church in relationship to Christ. We are stewards striving to honor and glorify God through everything we do."

Each person has gifts to give. Some are material gifts while some are time and energy. Some gifts are creative and special talents. **All gifts** are valuable and important both to the giver and to the church.

The first scripture reference to a tithe is found in Genesis 14:20. "For the Hebrew people, the tithe was a supreme act of faith that endorsed their belief that God would provide for them in time of need," says Dick. For us today tithing is a response to God's goodness. Dr. John Ed Mathison said in one of his sermons, "Tithing is a spiritual discipline. It is a tangible way for us to demonstrate that God comes first in our lives. Tithing reminds us that all we have comes from God."

We are reminded again in this chapter that "the institutional church is **NOT** the center of the Christian universe—**Christ is**. When the attention of the institutional church is on itself, the real work of the church, the transformation of the world into the Kingdom of God, will not get done. If, however, the attention of the church is on the people and on strengthening their relationship with God and their community in Christ, the church will grow, and the institutional church will flourish."

QUESTIONS FOR REFLECTION AND DISCUSSION

1. What are some of the ways our church celebrates giving? How do we communicate joy in giving? How do we communicate obligation?
2. Where did we learn to give? How was giving taught by our church when we were children? How is giving taught in our church now?
3. When giving is spoken of in our church, what specifically does it mean? Does our church seem to value one kind of giving over others?
4. In what ways does our church teach the need of the institution to receive? In what ways does our church teach the spiritual need of the giver to give?
